WHY IS THERE A NEED FOR WILDLIFE ETIQUETTE SHARING SESSIONS?



As Singapore progresses towards becoming a 'City in Nature' through the Singapore Green Plan 2030, more parks, nature reserves, and green-themed architecture will lead to inevitable wildlife encounters in urban and naturalised areas.

When speaking about the vision for 'City in Nature', Minister Desmond Lee shared, "Residents will be made more aware of the need to save resources – by switching off lights when they are not in use, recycling more and saving water – and coexist with the wildlife that will inevitably be drawn into the green urban landscape."

There is a pressing need for everyone in the community to learn about wildlife etiquette to avoid unnecessary panic or potential conflict situations as humans and animals live closer together than ever before. The ACRES Wildlife Management Team (WMT) comes in here.

WMT handles over 110 cases related to human-wildlife conflict a month in residential areas (condominiums, landed properties and HDB estates) and commercial areas.

Having worked with several partner organisations such as the National Parks Board (NParks), Public Utilities Board (PUB), Wildlife Reserves Singapore (WRS), Housing Development Board (HDB), Land Transport Authority (LTA), People's Association (PA), Jane Goodall Institute Singapore (JGIS) and academic institutions such as National University of Singapore (NUS) and Nanyang Technological University (NTU), ACRES strongly believes that community involvement and people empowerment are the keys to creating a better world for both animals and humans.



THE OBJECTIVE

- To empower your residents, staff, and contractors with the understanding of Singapore's most commonly encountered native wild animals
- To equip them with 'Dos and Don'ts' when they come across wild animals within the estate or property
- To minimise negative incidents resulting from human-wildlife conflict

DELIVERABLES



The content of our sessions will cover commonly sighted wildlife in Singapore's urban spaces and outreach involving these native species, including,

- How to identify commonly sighted venomous and non-venomous snakes
- Understanding macaque behaviour and their expressions
- Minimising wildlife encounters within estates through simple intervention methods
- Which agencies to call under different situations
- Common 'Dos and Don'ts' when encountering wildlife

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Target audience: property managers, residents, security staff, cleaning staff, contractors

The duration for a session: 60 to 90 minutes (including a Q&A after the session)

Mode of presentation: Face-to-face or Virtual (**zoom** or Google Meet **(**)

Programme fee: \$250 per virtual session; \$300 per physical session. Any donations outside the programme fee are very welcome to support our work as a charity organisation and are eligible for a 250% tax deduction.

Meet Rahayu. She is a 30 kg fully grown Malayan Turtle and is not a native species here. She was found crossing a road and the kind driver loaded her up and brought her to ACRES: Animal Concerns Research and Education Society (Singapore). It appears likely she was kept as a pet and abandoned. She had a fish hook embedded as well, probably left behind by some fisherman enthusiast. This species is endangered and is also sought after for meat.

It is not easy to send these creatures home but the Malaysian Wildlife Department would be receiving Rahayu in Johor and will reintroduce her back into her world.

We can all help by not generating demand for exotic and endangered pets, provide info where relevant and raise awareness.

Re: Testimonial of track record of ACRES in relation to Human-Wildlife Conflict

I am glad to provide this testimonial and letter of support to ACRES for the AVA grant application to manage wildlife encounters.

I began working on wildlife-related cases and human-wildlife conflict at NUS' Department of Zoology in the 1990's and liased with AVA CITES Unit then. I teach the subject in NUS and am a member of Working Groups for various species: Wild Boar, Long-tailed Macaques, Banded Leaf Monkey, Otters, Civet (now Urban Wildlife), Freshwater Crabs and Marine Turtles, I am also a member of the Nature Reserves Scientific Advisory Committee, Biodiversity Roundtable of Singapore and the Biodiversity Friends Forum.

I am familiar with ACRES since their origins, but began actively working with them over wildlife rescue and conflict issues at least from 2010. They participate in the same Working Groups, and play a frontline role with rescue of wildlife and conflict negotiation with people. They provide mentors and facilitators for the Biodiversity Friends Forum, which nurtures individuals new to the conservation scene into acting for nature. They maintain comprehensive databases and are responsive to research queries necessary to furthering conservation goals.

I have observed ACRES and their various staff over many years in relation to their actions, conduct and approach regarding a diversity of wildlife species. I have been able to observe their engagement and educational approach with diverse members of the public and student groups, of all ages, and their contribution to meetings with agencies and stakeholders.

ACRES has demonstrated a holistic perspective of issues, apply an integrated approach to conflict, manage, analyse and apply data very well to various situations, have the personality, institutional credibility, empathy and public support to front human-wildlife conflict issues in Singapore. They are open to new information and work well with all others in conservation and animal welfare.

I am able to provide my unreserved strong recommendation about the ability of ACRES to effectively fulfil the requirements of the grant call.
